

It is not a bereavement group more of a time to think and talk more freely about one of society's greatest taboos.



Cyclebag Talk by John Grimshaw

Thursday 16th January Talk 7pm Bar from 6.30pm £5

John will give an illustrated talk tracing the origins of the cycling campaign group, Cyclebag, which came into being at the Nova Scotia pub in July 1977. How this group then went onto build the Bristol and Bath path starting with Bitton to Brassmill Lane in 1979, the creation of the riverside path to Pill, the reconstruction of the Kennet and Avon canal towpath and other local paths which are now so popular. With the advent of the Government's Community Programme schemes they were able to tackle similar projects right across the country with

an eventual workforce of 800, working under the direction of the newly set up Bristol charity, Sustrans. Ten years ago he set up Greenways and Cycleroutes to concentrate on delivering local 'impossible' schemes including the missing link in Ashton Park and the Weston-super-Mare and Brean Down link over the Axe Sluices. All this work was based here in Clifton and Bristol.


The Great Escaper

Wednesday 2nd October

In the summer of 2014 - the 70th Anniversary of the D-Day Landings - octogenarian Bernie Jordan (Michael Caine) made global headlines. He'd staged a "great escape" from his care home to join fellow war veterans on a beach in Normandy, commemorating their fallen comrades.



The story begins when Samuel is found dead in the snow outside the isolated chalet where he lived with his wife Sandra, a German writer, and their partially-sighted 11-year-old son Daniel. An investigation leads to a conclusion of "suspicious death": it's impossible to know for sure whether he took his own life or was killed. Sandra is indicted, and we follow her trial which pulls the couple's relationship apart. Daniel is caught in the middle: between the trial and their home life, doubts take their toll on the mother-son relationship.





If Beale Street Could Talk

Rated 15 Wednesday 30th October


In early 1970s Harlem, daughter and wife-to-be Tish vividly recalls the passion, respect and trust that have connected her and her artist fiancé Alonzo Hunt, who goes by the nickname Fonny. Friends since childhood, the devoted couple dream of a future together, but their plans are derailed when Fonny is arrested for a crime he did not commit.

A United Kingdom Rated 12A Wednesday 13th November

In the late 1940s, Prince Seretse Khama of Bechuanaland is studying law in Britain in preparation for his eventual ascension to the throne. There, the dashing prince falls in love with a white British clerk, Ruth Williams, and they plan to marry. While they suspect that his uncle, the Regent, would disapprove, nothing prepares them for the diplomatic firestorm and domestic political tumult their defiant love would spark. Now facing a citizenry leery of a white Briton as their Queen, the international opposition is even more unyielding from the British holding their land as a protectorate and fearful of South Africa's racist backlash to this affront to their apartheid domination. Against all odds, King Khama and Ruth must struggle to maintain their love and help their people in a land that would become the Republic of Botswana.

With no family and nowhere to go over Christmas holiday in 1970, Paul remains at school to supervise students unable to journey home. After a few days, only one student holdover remains - a trouble-making 18-year-old named Angus, a good student whose bad behavior always threatens to get him expelled.

Joining Paul and Angus is head cook Mary (Randolph) - who caters to sons of privilege and



whose own son was recently lost in Vietnam. These three very different shipwrecked people form an unlikely Christmas family sharing comic misadventures during two very snowy weeks in New England. The real journey is how they help one another understand that they are not beholden to their past-they can choose their own futures.



Don't Look Now Rating 15 Wednesday 8th January

John and Laura Baxter are in Venice when they meet a pair of elderly sisters, one of whom claims to be psychic. She insists that she sees the spirit of the Baxters' daughter, who recently drowned. Laura is intrigued, but John resists the idea. He, however, seems to have his own psychic flashes, seeing their daughter walk the streets in her red cloak, as well as Laura and the sisters on a funeral gondola.

Films Stars Don't Die in Liverpool Rated 15

Wednesday 22nd January

Real life proves to be just as dramatic off-screen as it does on it for aging Hollywood superstar Gloria Grahame (Annette Bening) and her much younger lover, Peter Turner (Jamie Bell). As their mismatched romance waxes and wanes over time, events conspire to keep them in each other's lives even when it proves to be difficult and demanding. Ultimately, they find that they must each come to terms with whatever fate they face in the future whether they are together or apart.
